


Her book The Little Paris Bookshop has been translated into 36 languages and was a New York Times Bestseller. Since 2019, Nina George is President of the European Writers' Council (EWC).

She manages the advisory services for members, handles collective negotiations on behalf of educational writers in Sweden and drafts referral responses on proposed copyright legislation. The work of the Association is bifocal on both educational matters and copyright, where Alice mainly deals with issues on the latter. Alice also sits on the board of directors for several collecting societies in Sweden and is a member of the Swedish Copyright Association.



Jens J. Kramer, outgoing Chair of Das Syndikat – Association of German Language Crime Writers (Germany-Austria-Switzerland) is a writer of over a dozen historical, crime, romance novels and children's books under altogether four pen names. Jens studied ethnology and journalism in Berlin. Before he started writing in 1999, Jens earned his living in Berlin-Kreuzberg as a knifeman, in Styria as a stonemason, sold cars to Morocco and lived in Brittany for a few years to train as a pilot.








### **Moderators**
